Eric Gladhill introduced our guest speaker, Chido Munangagwa who is a native of Zimbabwe and came to the United States for her college education. She graduated from Gettysburg College where she studied Economics and minored in French. In her senior year, she was awarded a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship and went to pursue her Masters in Management at London Business School. She worked 3 years working for JPMorgan in New York and is currently working with Harry Stokes at Project Gaia, Inc. since the beginning of this year. At Project Gaia, Chido is a business analyst and works to help entrepreneurs in Africa with setting up their companies.

She thanked the club for awarding her the Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship and for awarding Project Gaia, Inc. the 2013 Eisenhower Humanitarian Award. The last time Chido spoke to our club was in 2011. Today she is sharing what is happening back home and with Project Gaia, Inc.

Zimbabwe, having a population of 14 million, is located in southern Africa. It is home to one of the Seven Wonders of the World, Victoria Falls which borders Zimbabwe and Zambia. Zimbabwe is home to the big 5: lions, rhinos, leopards, buffalos and elephants. Recently one of the famous lions also lived there, Cecil the Lion. In 1980 Zimbabwe gained independence from Britain as a direct result of the working relationship between President Robert Mugabe and

then Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher. His Excellency Robert Mugabe has served as president for the past 36 years, serving since December 1987. Zimbabwe is known for many things including its land-scape, diverse wildlife and agricultural products such as wheat, tobacco and corn. The country was known as "the Bread Basket of Africa".

In the 2000's things began to change to include land reform plan which redistributed the land. This created massive economic crisis, increased inflation and the country once known as the Bread Basket now had empty shelves. An example of how dire this crisis was, in May 2008, inflation was 230,000,000% and prices of goods and services was doubling every 24.7 hours. This extreme hardship drove many Zim-

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babweans to South Africa to purchase produce and food. These items were then brought back to Zimbabwe and resold in order to survive during this time of strife.

During this time many did not know what to do or who to turn to. The government was not providing for its people. Earlier this year, Pastor Evan Mawarire recorded a short video on his cellphone while holding the flag he aired many grievances, the hardships many face daily and called upon the government to be accountable and change. He posted this video to his Facebook page which went viral almost immediately. This movement is now known as the #This Flag campaign. Pastor Mawarire called for a peaceful demonstration, "stay away" for 1 day, literally closing down shops, businesses, schools, transportation and even the government. Pastor Mawarire was charged for inciting public violence and disturbing the peace followed by a charge of treason. On the day of his court appearance hundreds appeared showing their support and prayers. The day ended when all charges were dropped. Pastor Mawarire and his family now live in exile. This Flag movement is growing worldwide. Demonstrations have been held in the United Kingdom, South Africa, Kenya and Washington DC in support of Pastor Mawarire and the citizens of Zimbabwe.

Chido began working for Project Gaia, Inc. as an intern while a student at Gettysburg College. During this time she has helped PGI grow in providing an alternative cooking source for many families living in refugee camps in countries such as Ethiopia, Kenya, Madagascar, etc. PGI promotes clean, safe, efficient cook stoves which burn ethanol and methanol (alcohol). The stoves, which were developed specifically to be user friendly, economical, efficient, safe and clean, utilize a canister which is filled and easily refilled with the alcohol fuel. This alternative style of cooking provides many benefits to women and children; such as health benefits of not breathing cancer causing smoke, decrease in illnesses, safe alternative fuel and quicker cooking time. Currently women would walk many miles, 4 to 6 hours daily collecting firewood. During this time they faced abuse, sexual assault or violence, especially in areas of conflict.

While women and children, particularity girls, gathered firewood, this prevented them from pursuing an education or becoming gainfully employed and providing another source of income to the family. PGI helps to educate women to use the stove and begin their own business which in turn generates income for the family and helps the local economy. The average cost of a single burner stove is \$20-\$25 and a double burner stove is \$55-\$60 in South Africa. Costs for the ethanol or fuel for the stoves varies greatly such as \$1.20 per liter in Zimbabwe to ten cents per liter in Kenya. As more distilleries are brought online, the cost of fuel decreases in proportion to demand.

PGI does not directly provide the stove or fuel, but does partner with countries, foundations and other organizations worldwide in an advisory capacity to aide in distribution of stove, navigating through the vast governmental paperwork and further development of distilleries throughout these developing regions. At the current time the various governments control the production of the distilleries due to the fact that they are more interested in fuel blending.

PGI currently operates in 9 countries and assists with the operation of 4 micro distilleries. These distilleries use the countries own agricultural crops (corn, sugar, switchgrass, bitter molasses, etc.) brown coal, methane and other waste to produce the fuel for the stove. This entire project has aided in boosting the village economy and health, as well as globally by reducing the carbon footprint.

A final goal of Project Gaia, Inc. is to teach economies and world of the various alternative fuel choices that are available as fossil fuels are phased out or depleted globally.


